

What We Heard Report: Phase One Food Waste Engagement for the RDCO

February 2024

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Summary

In October 2023, the Regional District of Central Okanagan began Phase 1 of a public engagement process to gather feedback from residents on a possible curbside food waste collection program. The goal of Phase 1, Stage One of the engagement process was to measure overall community support for a curbside food waste program and identify concerns residents may have regarding this type of program.

To gather this information, the RDCO conducted a statistically valid survey with approximately 1800 residents randomly selected to participate.

In addition to the survey, the RDCO launched an online engagement opportunity at yoursay.rdco.com, providing residents with information on how our food waste is currently managed, and considerations for going forward with a curbside food waste program.

Survey results indicated 73% of respondents would support implementation of a food waste collection program. Of those residents that engaged via yoursay.rdco.com, 53% of comments were in strong support of a food waste program.




I fully support a food waste collection program with yard and food waste being done weekly and other garbage collected every other week. This was the arrangement we had in the city we lived in before we moved to the Central Okanagan. I believe it worked well.

Background

The Regional District of Central Okanagan's Solid Waste Management Plan includes re-evaluating organics diversion in the region and in particular determining if food waste diversion is supported by residents in the region.

Below is a recent timeline of events leading to the consideration of a curbside food waste program.

ROAD TO CURBSIDE FOOD WASTE COLLECTION



What we heard

In the fall of 2023 first steps to engage the public about food waste were undertaken through a statistically valid survey as well as education and engagement opportunities through the regional districts engagement platform yoursay.rdco.com.

The purpose of this initial consultation was to gain understanding of public acceptance for a food waste curbside collection program as well as identify concerns residents may have.

Below is a summary of benefits and concerns identified in the Survey and Yoursay.



Overall support

There is overall support among engagement participants for the implementation of a food waste collection program in the Central Okanagan. Residents see the service as a benefit to their household, and to the environment.



Cost concerns

There are concerns about cost increases with the addition of food waste collection to the existing service.



Nuisance of wildlife, rodents and odour

Residents have expressed a need to understand what can be done to minimize conflict with not only wildlife, but also rodents. Managing potential odours is also a concern



Scheduling concerns

Bi-weekly garbage collection is seen as a concern however those that were concerned felt they could manage using cart upgrades or tag-a-bag if needed.


What we heard cont...

Survey Results

A comprehensive mail in survey was conducted in October/November of 2023, with a random sample of 1800 Central Okanagan residents. Residents were asked to provide feedback on current behaviour, and satisfaction with current services. They were also asked to comment on proposed new curbside collection services under consideration to accommodate food waste collection

Overall, 30% of those that received a survey either returned their survey by mail or used a QR code to conduct the survey online.


Majority of residents put food waste in the garbage and thirty-five percent put food waste into backyard composters






the curb side but will not make the house smell.

Majority would support implementation of curbside food waste collection.



Main reasons for supporting a food waste collection program include increasing landfill life, soil improvement and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.



People are satisfied with current curbside collection services.

Eighty-nine percent of respondents were satisfied with their current curbside collection service. Ninety-one percent of respondents rated the value of their current curbside collection service as good or excellent.


New fees for the curbside food waste collection program are a top concern.

Sixty-three percent indicated they would be willing to pay more for the new food waste collection program, depending on cost. Fifty-four percent would support an increase of \$50/year for the new program. Twenty-seven percent would support an increase of \$100/year and 13% would support an increase of \$150/year for the new program.

Half would be concerned about bi-weekly garbage pick-up.

If food waste pick-up were to be implemented, 53% would be concerned about shifting from weekly to every other week garbage collection. With bi-weekly garbage pick-up, 65% expected to have more garbage than their current cart's capacity.

The majority could manage extra garbage through cart upsizing or tag-a-bag sticker program






Storing food waste attracts wildlife/pests and is messy

While the majority of residents said they would participate in a food waste program, those that would not identify two main barriers:

- storing food waste is messy, odorous, and takes up too much space.
- storing food waste attracts wildlife and pests.



Resident's top priorities for changes to their curbside collection include making it user friendly with easy to follow rules, affordable and convenient



What we heard cont...

Your Say Results

The RDCO Your say engagement page was set up to inform residents on how organics such as vard waste and food waste are currently managed. The page also provided access to the 2022 Feasibility Study and considerations for a future food waste program using existing residential yard waste carts.

Visitors of the Your say page also had the opportunity to ask questions, make comment or participate in a discussion forum. Most visitors who engaged used the question tool to either make comments or ask specific questions.

- 2256 residents visited the Your say food waste page.
- 579 visited multiple sections of the Your say platform including downloading provided documents or viewing multiple pages.
- 157 engaged through the Q&A or discussion forum.
- 53% of comments were in strong support of a food waste program, many having experienced this type of service in other communities.
- The top three comment topics were about wildlife and rodents (25%), costs (5%) and if multifamily was under consideration (4%).
- 4.6% that engaged were not in support of a food waste program.

The common themes raised by your say participants were analyzed through the survey tool word cloud, and the top tags were created as categories.

Regional Food Waste Collection Survey 2023

Detailed Report on Findings

Executive Summary

A comprehensive mail survey was conducted with a random sample of 1733 Central Okanagan residents in November 2023. Residents were asked to provide feedback on new curbside collection services under consideration as well as rate their satisfaction with the services provided by the Regional District of Central Okanagan. 522 people completed the survey, giving a response rate of 30%.

Majority of food waste put in garbage

Currently, 41% of households put *all* of their food waste in the garbage, 22% put *most* of their food waste in the garbage and 28% put *some* of their food waste in the garbage.

Majority of households do not compost

Fifty-nine percent of households *do not compost*. Thirty-eight percent use *a backyard compost* and **4%** use an *indoor composter*.

People are satisfied with current curbside collection services

Eighty-nine percent of respondents are satisfied with their current garbage and yard waste curbside collection service. Ninety-one percent of respondents rate the value (\$170/household) of their current curbside collection service as good or excellent.

Majority would support implementation of curbside food waste collection

Seventy-three percent of respondents were enthusiastic about a curbside food waste collection program.

Half would be concerned about bi-weekly garbage pick-up

If food waste pick-up is implemented, 53% would be concerned about shifting from weekly to every other week garbage collection. With bi-weekly garbage pick-up, 65% expect to have more garbage than their current cart's capacity.

Storing food waste attracts wildlife/pests and is messy

The 2 main barriers to participating in a food waste collection program are that storing food waste is messy, odorous, and takes up to much space and storing food waste attracts wildlife and pests.

New fees for the curbside food waste collection program is a top concern

Sixty-three percent indicated they would be willing to pay more for the new food waste collection program, depending on cost. **54%** would support an increase of \$50/year for the new program. **27%** would support an increase of \$100/year and **13%** would support an increase of \$150/year for the new program.

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Introduction

In November of 2023, the Regional District of the Central Okanagan conducted a comprehensive mail survey with a random sample of Residents. Residents of the region were asked to evaluate their current waste and recycling collection services and programs. In addition, a new food waste collection program was evaluated by respondents. The survey was an important step in the process to include input from citizens when the Regional District is making operational, service and budget decisions for the upcoming years.

Discovery Research, an independent consulting firm, was retained to conduct the 2023 Regional Food Waste Collection Survey. The survey was designed so that citizens' opinions could be easily summarized and prioritized. A mail survey was selected to ensure a random, representative sample with a sufficient sample size to produce statistically valid results that accurately and reliably represent the opinions of residents. This report provides detailed results from the mail survey.


Objectives

The 2023 Citizen Satisfaction Survey has the following objectives:

- > Measure citizens' usage and satisfaction levels with the various curbside collection services.
- > Determine the public's views as to new programs being considered by Regional District.
- > Identify areas for improvement.
- > Summarize the public's views as to the priority of future operational or infrastructure improvements.

Methodology

A random sample of 1,800 Central Okanagan residents were mailed a survey in October 2023. The random sample was generated such that each customer had an equal opportunity of being selected for the research. 67 surveys were incorrectly addressed and returned to sender. 522 surveys were completed, giving a response rate of 30%.



This bar graph displays the margin of error associated with various sample sizes.

Statistics generated from a sample size of **522** will be accurate within $\pm 4.3\%$, at the 95% confidence interval (19 times out of 20).


Weighting

The population distribution by age of homeowners in the RDCO was taken from Statistics Canada, 2021 Census of Population results. The sample statistics have been weighted to match the Census distribution.

Section 1 – Current Behavior


Q1. Curbside Collection Services currently receiving



All of the respondents (100%) are currently receiving *garbage* collection services.

Ninety-nine percent of respondents are currently receiving *recycling* collection services and **96%** are receiving *yard* waste collection services.


Q2. What Citizens currently do with their food waste



Eighty-one percent of RDCO residents currently dispose their food waste into their *garbage*.

Thirty-five percent of residents deposit their food waste into a backyard compost and 10% feed animals with household food waste.


Q3. Current food waste being thrown out



Forty-one percent of residents place *all* household food waste in their garbage cart and **22%** put *most* food waste into their garbage cart.


Only **8%** of residents reported *not placing any food waste into their garbage carts*.

Q4. Expired food placed in garbage carts



Fourteen percent indicated they throw *lots* of food waste in the garbage because it has gone bad and **67%** said they throw out *some* food waste because it has gone bad.


Q5. Current composting activities



Fifty-nine percent of residents said that their household is *not currently composting*.


Thirty-eight percent are currently *backyard* composting and **4%** are *indoor* composting.

Q6. What Citizens are doing with soiled paper




Ninety-five percent of residents are placing their soiled paper such as napkins, paper towels & paper plates in the *garbage*.

Q7. Current garbage disposal habits



Forty-eight percent of households partially fill their garbage carts for weekly pick up and 36% completely fill their garbage carts each week for pick up.


Q8. Yard waste disposal habits



Forty-nine percent of households *fill their* yard waste carts for bi-weekly pick up.


While 33% of households are only filling their yard waste carts from time to time.

Q9. Awareness of additional garbage Tag-a-bag stickers




Over half (58%) were *not aware* that they could purchase additional Tag-a-Bag stickers for garbage collection.

Q10. Awareness of the option to upsize garbage carts




Seventy-eight percent of respondents were *aware* of the option to upsize their garbage carts.

Q11. Citizens aware of yard waste carts



Fifty-six percent said that they *are aware* of the option to add additional yard waste carts for an additional fee.


Q12. Household recycling habits



The vast majority of households (90%) are currently recycling as much as they can and 10% indicated their household could recycle more.


Section 2 – Satisfaction with Current Services

Q14. Satisfaction with current curbside collection services



Eighty-nine percent of respondents are either satisfied (57%) or very satisfied (32%) with their current garbage and yard waste residential curbside collection service.

Q15. Value for current cost of services



Ninety-one percent of respondents feel that the current cost of garbage and yard waste curbside collection services are either an excellent value (23%) or a good value (68%).

Why is it a 'poor' value?


- \$170\year is a lot of money on top of all the existing taxes and other costs of home ownership, e.g. property taxes, utility billing, general property maintenance, etc.



Q16. How Citizens feel about implementing a food waste collection program




Seventy-nine percent would welcome a food waste collection program being implemented with 37% saying they feel very positively about this change and 42% feel positively.

Q17. Citizen support for the implementation of food waste collection




Thirty-five percent of households were *very enthusiastic* and **38%** were *enthusiastic* about support for a curbside food waste collection program.

Q18. Citizen motivation to participate in food waste collection



The top 2 motivating benefits (both at 74%) for participating in the potential food waste program were: returning a nutrient source to the environment – soil improvements and increasing the lifespan of the landfill by less waste in the garbage. Reducing greenhouse gas emissions from methane generation (59%) was also a top choice.


Q19. Food waste in landfills



Seventy percent were concerned over the environmental impact of food waste in the landfill.

Q20. Bi-weekly collection feedback


Many other communities with food waste collection have every other week garbage and recycling collection, with weekly organics (yard and food waste) collection, as they find they produce less garbage. Based on your household's garbage habits, would shifting from weekly to every other week garbage be a concern for your household, if food waste collection is implemented?



If the RDCO were to implement bi-weekly curbside garbage collection, 53% of residents have *concern* around this decision.

Alternatively, **43%** of residents surveyed have stated that they are *not concerned* about this potential change.

Q21. Bi-weekly garbage collection and cart size




If garbage collection changes to bi-weekly and a weekly food waste collection is added, 65% feel they will have more than their current garbage cart's capacity:

22% almost always;

25% sometimes and

19% rarely.

Q22. Extra garbage & Tag-A-Bag




Among the 336 respondents who expect to have more garbage than their current cart's capacity, 74% of these residents, say they can manage their extra household garbage by either upsizing their cart or using a tag-a-bag sticker.

Q23. Combining food and yard waste



Sixty-seven percent of respondents believe that combining food and yard waste for a weekly pickup would be a positive change from the current bi-weekly yard waste pickup schedule.


Q24. Environmental benefits



Ninety-four percent agree that *reducing* what goes in the landfill should be a priority.

Ninety-three percent of respondents agreed that *composting helps* the environment.


Q25. Potential changes to curbside collection program



Ninety-three percent feel it is important to consider the financial-user fees to residents when considering making changes to curbside collection.


Ninety percent feel the environmental impact is important to consider when changing curbside collection.

Q26. Separating garbage, yard & food waste



Eighty-three percent felt their household is *very likely* (66%) or *likely* (17%) to participate in separating food waste from garbage and placing it in their yard waste carts for curbside collection.


Q27. Barriers to participating in a food waste collection program



The majority (66%) will participate in a food waste collection program.


Among people that won't participate, 23% indicated they want to avoid attracting wildlife and pests and 23% indicated food waste collection will be messy, smelly and require too much space.

Q28. Citizen priorities for potential changes




The top 3 priorities when considering changes to residential curbside collection are: user friendly - well communicated and simple rules about what goes where (62%); affordability-keeping user fees low (53%); convenience-easy to use, helps reduce odours (50%).

Q29. Potential concerns about curbside food waste collection program



Fifty-nine percent are concerned about *new* fees associated with curbside collection service and 42% are concerned about attracting insects/rodents/bears.


Q30. Cost of a food waste program



Nineteen percent of respondents would be willing to pay more for a curbside food waste collection program and 44% said maybe, depending on the cost.


Thirty-seven percent would not pay more for a food waste collection program.

Q31. Support for a cost of an additional \$50/year




Fifty-four percent support (19% strongly support and 35% support) adding a food waste collection program for \$50/year.

Q32. Support for a cost of an additional \$100/year




Twenty-seven percent support (6% strongly support and 21% support) adding a food waste collection program for \$100/year.

Thirteen percent support (3% strongly support +10% support) adding a food waste collection program for \$150/year.


Q34. How Citizens currently stay informed



The majority of respondents are currently accessing information about solid waste services *online*.

Forty-three percent of respondents access information through the *RDCO* website, **38%** are accessing this information on the *Municipality's* website.


Q35. How would you like to learn about how the new program works



Most respondents (82%) would like to receive information how on this program works via direct mail with an information guide mailed with program launch, including a kitchen bin sticker decal or a howto sheet to put on fridge.




Thirty-one percent of the sample was from *Kelowna*, **28%** from *West Kelowna* and **25%** from *Lake Country*.

Q37. Age




Twenty-one percent of respondents were 70 years or older and 20% were 60-69 years old.

Thanks so much for participating! Some of the communities that have been collecting f ood waste for some time do not have a landfill that captures methane and are running o ut of immediate landfill space. We have been very fortunate to have been collecting yar d waste for decades (which diverts large volumes of organics from landfill) and produci ng a class A compost product (Glengrow). Our regions only landfill also captures over 70% of methane gas produced by decomposing organics (including food waste). We d o however recognize that many would still like to see a food waste collection service an d it will only enhance our current organics diversion programs as well as increase our GHG reductions.



I totally support curbside food waste collection by RDCO. Although given the amount of yard waste those of us who live in rural or treed areas have, I do not think that having a joint food and yard collection is feasible. They should be separate, especially if the com posting with food waste needs to be done out of area. We do not need more trucks on the highways, more congestion and pollution, especially as emissions is something this change is trying to reduce. Would it not be better to keep yard waste as it is, being composted locally, and then add a weekly food waste collection and move general rubbish to very two weeks? I lived elsewhere when a weekly food waste collection was introduced. We went from putting out general waste once a week to once every 3 months! Along with collecting and taking soft plastics to a collection centre, the food waste collection enabled us to totally change our personal waste management. In that location we were able to also have our own compost but in the OK Valley I do not find that is feasible due to wildlife issues and a dryer climate. As far as I am concerned this can't come soon en ough but please rethink combining yard waste and food waste, if it cannot be compost ed locally.



I support curbside compost pick up! We currently pay a private service to grab our compost weekly from residential neighborhood. This would be incredible!



I support composting collection but I do not support the collection of black garbage bi-w eekly. This is going to lead to more issues right wildlife. Residents don't abide by the re quirement to only put garbage out on collection day today and there is little to no policin g on this. In many smaller homes there is nowhere to put the garbage and hold on to it f or an extra week. You're also suggesting using up some of the green bin for compost a nd although you will be collecting this more frequently it's going to be disruptive to the y ard waste. We're already paying more for extra green bins and paying for additional yard waste at the transfer station. And what will you be charging for this service? And how exactly will this save on emissions overall, you still have us individually driving to recycling depots to recycle drink containers which isn't green.

AGREES

Thank you for your comments, our feasibility study showed that combining food with ex isting yard waste carts is the most feasible option. We looked at have a separate cart j ust for food waste and it did not score as high as combined collection mostly because having a separate cart would require all separate trucks (more emissions). You are correct however, if it is combined it may need to be transferred elsewhere s the final proces sing facility has yet to be determined. Once we understand if the public is in favour of f ood waste collection (this first phase on engagement), we will review all the collection a nd processing options and conduct further engagement with the public. Hope you will we eigh in again once we have further details on what the system may look like.



I completely support having food waste composting in the Okanagan. I previously lived in a city that collectively recycled food waste on a weekly basis. They had curbside blu e and green recycling pickup each week, and had regular garbage collection every two weeks. It was noted that a weekly garbage pickup was no longer needed when food w aste was diverted into composting (versus garbage pickup). Food waste from any individual, or group of individuals, takes up a lot of space in the truck. The diversion of food waste (bones, peelings, cores, eggshells etc.) really reduces your regular garbage a lot. My adult children both live in and they both have h ad food composting services available to them for a number of years. I understand th at there is a financial cost involved in setting up a district-wide food waste composting program, but given society's concern regarding the preservation of the environment, and the amount of landfill space we need both now, and in the future, it is definitely a posit ive solution to these concerns.



Caught in the middle. I think it's a great idea, BUT - (1) are you still going to make resid ents pay for larger green bins to accommodate more waste? (2) how are you going to make them wildlife safe for those who do not have a place to store them indoors? (3) are you going to make residents pay for however you decide to make these bins wildlife safe? (4) are residents going to receive some kind of rebate for you profiting off waste that we pay to have picked up? (5) will residents have the option to return and no longer pay for the larger black bins if they feel they will no longer need it (6) will residents have to pay for a larger black bin since collection will only be done biweekly? I'm not ok with paying more for services that the district gets to profit from. There is little to no benefit to me as a resident if this change is implemented.



Hello, yes you are correct, methane gas is being collected from the Glenmore landfill. About 70% is captured and sol d to Fortis as fuel. There is still 30% that enters the atmosphere. We do not know the exact cost to taxpayers yet. If re sidents are in support of the idea of food waste collection we will work to determine what the collection system will loo k like and do further public engagement that will include costs.

Hello waste, you are correct that there is still GHG impacts from picking up waste. Our recent Food Waste Feasibilit y study looked at several options including collecting food waste separate, collecting food waste in existing yard waste carts, keeping food waste in the garbage and using kitchen compost appliances. Adding food waste to existing yard w aste carts was shown to be the most feasible. This would not require extra trucks as trucks are already doing the wor k. We are proposing moving food waste from the garbage cart to the yard waste cart.





Given the city will sell this compost, it should cost the tax payer zero to implement. The costs associated with curbsid e pickup and landfill drop off are very high for what the service provides.



We 100% LOVE and support this! I've lived in Kelowna for a year, . Vernon has a composting pro gram and it's wonderful. Calgary also has a similar program. For readers who don't know how the Vernon program wo rks, as mentioned, compost is collected weekly, and garbage bi-weekly. Garbage pickup every other week was fine be cause anything that was stinky or smelly was put into the compost anyway, for weekly pickup. Vernon provided count ertop containers and I bought compost bags for those. Just as you would take your kitchen garbage to your garbage c an, you now bring your compost bags to the compost bin for weekly pickup. So many items were allowed in the comp ost ... paper plates, napkins, paper towels, bones (chicken, steak, fish), all meal leftovers, compostable take out conta iners, wood utensils, light cardboard (I think), eggshells ... I'm sure I've forgotten a few, but it was amazing. With a family of three, I had very little garbage. Sometimes I didn't even have enough for a bi-weekly pickup. I can appreciate the fact that people may have rats in their yard composts and that definitely has to be taken into consideration. My exp erience was stellar - we did not experience rats or rodents of any kind with the compost program. Vernon rolled out th e program very well. There was a default size for the bins, and if you wanted a smaller/larger size, you were given a ti meframe in which to contact to get your name on that list. I chose both the smaller 120L size for both compost and ga rbage (2 young adults, 1 old adult (ha - not that old!!). I am very excited of the potential for this program in Kelowna!! Kudos to the program organizers!

Most existing compost facilities that are permitted to take food waste near us, are using the finished product for both sale for garden use, as well as mine reclamation. Thank you for sharing your feedback. Yes, food waste when landfilled decomposes and gradually creates methane gas, a powerful greenhouse gas. Seventy per cent of the methane gas generated at the Glenmore landfill is captured and diverted through the renewable natural gas upgrade plant operated by FortisBC to heat homes in the region, and the remaining methane not captured is released into the environment. We appreciate your comments.



Where is the facility for composting currently located?



Publicly Answered

Currently our yard waste is going to the Glenmore landfill for composting, however this facility is not permitted to take food waste. There are currently several composting facilities that can accept food waste in the interior of British Colum bia, however it has yet to be determined where material collected in the Central Okanagan will end up.

Publicly Answered

Thanks for this question. Yes, GHG emissions are still produced from a compost program due to collection, transferring and hauling, as well as the compost processing itself (running equipment for example). However there is also more carbon capture with composting versus landfilling, and landfilling produces methane, a more powerful GHG. Collecting food waste in yard waste carts rather than sending to the landfill will see an overall reduction of CO2 equivalent gas of 28,500 tonnes compared to what we are doing today. Hello we are proposing that food waste would go into your existing yard waste cart and that collection would change to every week. Your garbage could then be collected every other week instead as there wouldn't be food wast e in there. If food waste goes into the yard waste cart, then collection of the yard waste cart would also be year round.



Also, further to above comments, I am 100% in favour of collecting and composting our food scraps, veg tops, veg pe elings, fruit waste, etc and would welcome a weekly collection. However, not in same green bin we now use for grass clippings.

We have moved to Kelowna a few years back from wears. We had organic waste collection there for man y years. We were surprised that it is not in Kelowna given that BC is always more environmentally conscious. We had our share of raccoons there and it was not an issue if the bins were only taken out in the morning of the collection. Al ong with the blue bin and the recycling depot (for plastic bags, glassware, styrofoam etc), 90% of our garbage is organic. We had considered a composter ourselves but we have zero scape landscaping (strongly encouraged in our subdivision), we have no use for compost. It would be wonderful if the city could find a place to compost the organic waste locally. In every spring the city will truck the compost to community centre to distribute them to local gardeners. It's so popular that they always ran out in the first hour!



Normally, we have very little in the "green bin" as we use it for yard clean up only in the early spring and in the fall. We do not have a lawn so there are no lawn clippings in the "green bin". The "green bin" is huge and if food scraps are included in this bin this require s that I store the large "green bin" in my garage to prevent rodents, bears and other animals form gaining access. I do not have room in my garage to store the "green bin" on an ongoing basis. Will meat scraps, bones and fish scraps go into the "green bin"? Largely populated centres in India, China, Africa and some U.S.A. cities contribute to methane g as more than the City of Kelowna does. If Kelowna implements this type of program, we would have a minimal, if any, impact on the production of methane gas in the world. Also, if you implement such a program what about the production of greenhouse gases by vehicles which will be used to transport the food scraps and yard waste from a transfer station to a facility that can compost such materials? If you want to impact the amount of methane gas produced, what about the City of Kelowna doing something about enforcing the "no-idling" of vehicles which are in the long line ups of the drive-throughs at places like Tim Hortons, Starbucks and Wendy's???!!!!! 




