





Immigration Minister Marc Miller is announcing a two-year cap on international student admissions.

The minister hopes the cap will give the federal and provincial government time to curb a system that he says is taking advantage of high international student tuition while providing, in some cases, a poor education.

The cap will mean a 35 per cent overall reduction in new study visas this year though some provinces, including Ortario, will see a reduction of 50 per cent or more.




CANADA, 1976 to 2041







An estimated 6,467 new people arrived in the Central Okanagan in 2022, the largest single annual increase in the past decade.

There were 5,475 new people in 2021 and only 2,521 in 2012.

The rate of growth was 2.8%, which is the second highest in the past decade, falling short of 2016's 2.9% when the population grew by 5,595.

That is according to Statistics Canada's population estimates as posted on a new data portal created by the Cantral Okanagan Economic Development Commission.

It shows the regional population reached 235,472 last year.

The labour force totalled 125,600 in May with a regional unemployment rate of 2,8% when compared to a national unemployment rate that hit 5.4% in June and a provincial rate of 5.6%.






Our region's growth has most recently been driven by heightened levels of **international** and **domestic** migration.

This is why we embarked on this project, and will continue **monitor** these trends closely to aid in our ability to anticipate **growth & change**.













By 2046 our population is anticipate to **grow** by between **43,000 – 119,000** new residents. The medium scenario estimate is **86,000** new residents by 2046.

By 2046 the region will also change. We will have a lot more workers (54% more), which will help support the a growing economy as well as an aging (and retiring) population.






distribution of population (high scenario)



By 2046, the region will need to add upwards of 53,000 net new homes to accommodate its growing and changing population.

This however does NOT account for any existing unmet demand within the region's housing system. These numbers will be refined by each community through its Housing Needs Report (HNR) that is required to be completed by January 1, 2025.
