Subject: Okanagan Lake Responsibility Planning Initiative – Project Update

Purpose: To provide the Regional Board with an update on the Okanagan Lake Responsibility

Planning Initiative.

Executive Summary:

The Okanagan Lake Responsibility Planning Initiative emerged in response to the Okanagan Lake Foreshore Inventory and Mapping reports that identified large-scale loss of natural areas around the lake and has expanded to address cumulative impacts in the Okanagan watershed and syilx territory. The initiative is co-led by the Okanagan Collaborative Conservation Program, the Okanagan Nation Alliance, the Regional District of Central Okanagan, the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations, and Rural Development, and the University of British Columbia.

Scott Boswell, of the Okanagan Collaborative Conservation Program (OCCP), will provide an update on the project background and activities completed to date.

Background:

The kłúsxnítkw (Okanagan Lake) Responsibility Planning Initiative (OKLRPI) emerged in response to the Okanagan Lake Foreshore Inventory and Mapping (FIM) reports that identified large-scale loss of natural areas around the lake¹ and has expanded to address cumulative impacts of resource extraction activities in the Okanagan watershed and syilx territory. The initiative's planning process has incorporated a syilx water responsibility planning methodology that has created an ethical space where syilx and non-syilx partners can share values and perspectives for identifying solutions for social equality and greater environmental protection for water and land.

The initiative is being co-led by the Okanagan Collaborative Conservation Program (OCCP), the Okanagan Nation Alliance (ONA), the Regional District of Central Okanagan (RDCO), the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations, and Rural Development (MFNLRORD), and the University of British Columbia (UBC). In 2022, the initiative will complete a series of workshops and interviews to gather syilx and non-syilx perspectives and identify key actions to inform the first siwłkw (Water) Responsibility Plan.

The project will address the impacts threatening the long-term viability of natural areas to provide clean drinking water, habitat for fish and wildlife, erosion and flood control, and climate change mitigation. Through the development of the siwłkw (Water) Responsibility Plan the partners will identify a clear set of actions for new or updated policies, regulations, and programming that support source water protection. The multi-jurisdictional and collaborative nature of the initiative also supports the long-term development of relationships for local government and syilx strategic land use documents, and financial partnerships to implement the actions of the plan.

Valley Wide Collaboration

The essential component of the OKLRPI is collaboration and, through its planning process, is creating strong working relationships with syilx and non-syilx partners. It is also breaking down silos by creating channels for shared decision-making processes. The development of the siwłkw (Water) Responsibility Plan with its focus on equitable and effective decision-making and co-management is inspiring for the partners. This initiative's work to uphold the calls to action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and the advancement of the *Declaration on the Right of Indigenous Peoples Act* is stimulating the identification of innovative ways in caring for the land and water. This process and its momentum can be carried to other projects.

There are over 50 individuals representing 27 organizations involved in the planning process. To date, the Okanagan Nation Chiefs Executive Council, seven municipalities and three regional districts have provided formal resolutions of support for the initiative and the Province has assigned dedicated staff to the initiative. The RDCO Regional Board provided support, in principle, for the development of this initiative on July 18, 2019.

Multi-phased Approach

The OKLRPI first meeting was held in the fall of 2018 and brought together representatives from First Nation, local, and regional governments, as well as conservation organizations to discuss collaborative ways for addressing the loss of natural areas surrounding the lake, and the need for a syilx led planning process to address the need for greater environmental protection. **Figure 1** below highlights the progression of the initiative.

2019

- •Formal support was attained by resolutions from the Okanagan Nation Chiefs Excecutive Council, Mayors and Councils, and Regional Districts in the Okanagan Basin.
- •An initial workshop was facilitated to establish guiding principles and introduce a syilx water methodology planning process.

2020

- Conducted a policy review of local and provincial government environmental protection measures for Okanagan Lake's shorelines, tributaries, and watershed.
- A gap analysis on environmental legislation and interviews with senior management identified the need for new legislation and a desire to learn more about syilx water laws and how they apply to water and land management.

2021

- •Organized several capacity building workshops using a syilx n\awqnwixw planning process. The workshops examined syilx values and perspectives through the lenses of the four food chiefs, and identified issues and solutions for greater cultural and environmental protection.
- •This work unveiled the systemic issues that are holding land use planning processes in place, examined syilx water laws and new provincial DRIPA legislation for establishing power-sharing opportunities for land use decision-making.

2022

•The initiative will complete interviews and workshops with syilx leadership and community members and non-syilx government staff and elected officials to gather input and direction for developing the siwłkw (Water) Responsibility Plan.

Regional Growth Strategy:

The RDCO adopted Regional Growth Strategy (RGS) Bylaw No. 1336 on June 23, 2014. A RGS is a long-range planning tool that assists local governments to plan a coordinated future for their communities while dealing with regional issues and decisions that cross local political boundaries. The RGS is also a collective vision from the regional partners for the future to create a region that promotes growth that is economically, environmentally, and socially healthy over a twenty (20) year time horizon.

The following policies of the RGS support the initiative:

Our Water

- Continue in partnership with the Okanagan Basin Water Board and regional partners to encourage valley wide cooperation and coordination regarding the conservation of water and protection of all water sources.
- Consider water resources in land use planning decisions.

Our Economy

 Support effectively managing and protecting the integrity of the Region's critical assets such as the lakes, natural environment, and agricultural lands that promote attraction of employment and investment.

Our Ecosystems

- Encourage collaboration to adopt consistent terminology, policies and actions that support the protection and conservation of environmental features and watersheds within the Region.
- Manage growth to minimize disturbance to habitat, watershed, and natural drainage areas and systems.
- Explore funding mechanisms to support regionally significant natural areas, open space and parkland acquisitions.
- Support cooperation with regional partners on environmental matters, particularly where there are developments/issues located adjacent to political boundaries.

Considerations:

Organizational/External: The Regional District is involved in the planning process though

collaboration with project partners and other administrative functions.

Financial: As part of the 2022 budget deliberations, the Regional Board approved

\$25,000.00 for the development of the Okanagan Lake Responsibility Planning Initiative. Further, in 2021 the RDCO was awarded a multi-year grant in the amount of \$300,000.00 from the Vancouver Foundation to support the project. Other funding partners include the Okanagan Basin Water Board, Healthy Watershed Initiative, University of British Columbia, Environment and Climate Change Canada, and the Real Estate

Foundation of BC.
